- **Keeping the Bite Correct**: By replicating the shape of your original tooth, it helps maintain your bite, keeping your teeth aligned. If the bite feels off, it is important to let us to correct it.
- **Protecting the Prepared Tooth**: Acting as a shield, it protects the prepared tooth from sensitivity, damage, and potential infection.

## **Taking Care of Your Temporary Crown**

Your temporary crown needs some special care to last until your permanent crown is ready:

- **Be Gentle with Your Teeth**: Try to chew on the opposite side of the temporary crown and avoid hard or sticky foods that could dislodge it.
- **Brush and Floss Carefully**: Continue your oral hygiene routine but be extra gentle around the temporary crown. When flossing, it is best to pull the floss out of the contact to the side versus popping it back up between the teeth. This reduces the chance of the temporary crown dislodging.
- **Sensitivity is Normal**: Minor sensitivity around the crown area is normal. A newly prepared tooth with a temporary crown is less insulated so the tooth's nerve can feel more. Over-the-counter pain relievers can help with the sensitivity.

Temporary crowns are durable, but they aren't meant to last forever. Here's what to do if yours comes off or breaks:

- **Immediate Actions to Take**: Try to retrieve the crown if it comes off and keep it in a safe place. If it breaks, collect all the pieces you can.
- **Contacting the Dental Practice**: Give us a call right away. We'll schedule an appointment to fix or replace the crown as needed.
- **Temporary Measures Until Appointment**: If you can't reach us immediately, you may use over-the-counter dental adhesive as a temporary solution, but it's best to get professional care as soon as possible.
